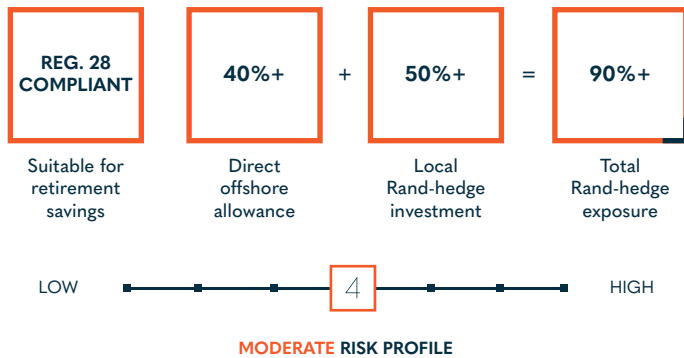


FUND OBJECTIVE

The Fund aims to deliver medium to long-term capital growth over time. The Fund is differentiated in the ASISA South African – Multi-Asset – High Equity category by focusing primarily on investments with international or Rand-hedge revenue streams. Elevated returns are targeted by utilising its full offshore and equity allowances. The Fund complies with Regulation 28 of the Pension Funds Act.

INVESTOR SUITABILITY

The Fund is suitable for retail and institutional investors seeking maximum offshore exposure, within the bounds of Regulation 28. Therefore, it is appropriate for retirement savings and Tax-Free Savings Accounts. While volatility is expected to be less than an equity-only fund, investors must be willing to endure periods of short-term downturns. An investment horizon of 5+ years is recommended.

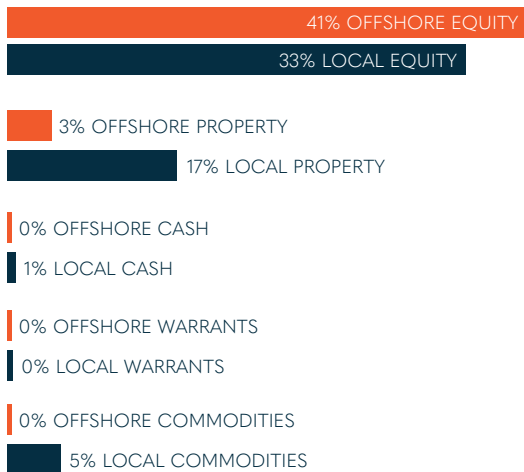

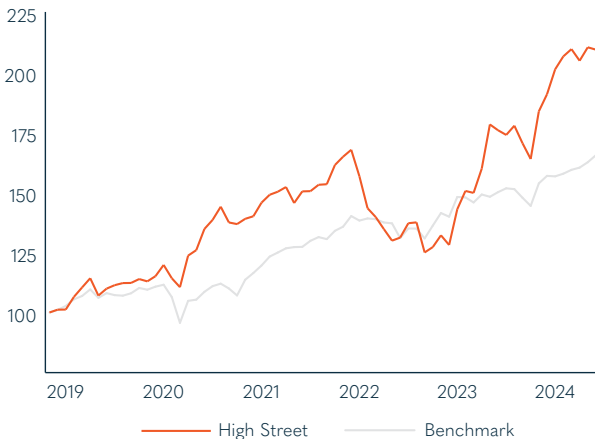

QUARTERLY COMMENTARY AS AT 30 JUNE 2024

For the quarter ended 30 June, the Fund returned -0.1%, versus the category peer average of 3.8%. Fund performance was hampered by significant Rand strength with the Rand appreciating by 3.6% against the US Dollar. Year-to-date the Fund has returned 9.7%, versus the category peer average of 5.5%.

Globally, the economic momentum from the first quarter of 2024 extended into the second quarter, resulting in another positive period for equity markets. The MSCI World Index posted a 2.8% return in USD (-0.9% in ZAR) in Q2, while the S&P 500 returned 4.3% in USD (0.4% in ZAR). Initially, investor concerns about the US economy overheating led to scaled-back forecasts for central bank rate cuts and a negative market reaction to strong April economic data. However, these fears diminished as the quarter progressed, renewing optimism for a soft landing. In Europe, economic momentum also remained strong as the cost-of-living shock continued to subside.

Domestically, the JSE bounced back strongly from the weakness of the first quarter, with the JSE All Share Index returning 8.2% in Q2. Following the elections in South Africa, the formation of the GNU and ongoing political discussions are now shaping policy direction. To date, positive sentiment surrounding this progress has boosted both the markets and the Rand.

The Fund's offshore component exhibited strong performance in the quarter, driven by robust corporate earnings. Nvidia emerged as the standout performer, achieving a 37% return in USD. The company once again posted impressive earnings (Q1), underscoring the sustained demand for its AI chips. Nvidia reported revenue growth exceeding 260%, alongside a 690% increase in operating profit.

Starbucks was the largest detractor within the offshore component, returning -14% in USD. This decline was precipitated by a negative earnings release in which the company failed to meet expectations, reporting shrinking same-store sales and declining traffic across all regions. Starbucks also significantly lowered its full-year guidance, predicting continued underperformance of its cafés for several quarters. While the broader consumer discretionary sector has faced pressure in recent months, some of Starbucks' challenges appear to be partially self-inflicted and potentially due to mismanagement. We will continue to monitor this holding closely in order to gauge whether the company's investment case has materially changed.

The local component experienced mixed performance and, given its extreme Rand-hedge bias, was negatively impacted by the strong Rand. Prosus was the largest contributor, returning 9%, driven by the performance of its investment in Chinese tech giant Tencent. In May, Tencent posted strong earnings, with a 62% year-on-year net profit increase driven by its advertising and business services divisions. In June, Prosus reported robust full year earnings, with revenues from continuing operations (which excludes Tencent) rising 12%.

Under new CEO Fabricio Bloisi, a focus on cost-cutting and profitability led to the e-commerce division achieving its first-ever profit. Prosus also reported an almost 200% increase in headline earnings per share, bolstered by sustained share buybacks funded by proceeds from the partial sale of its Tencent stake. Over the past two years, Prosus has repurchased over 20% of its market capitalization.

Multinational food service company Bidcorp was the biggest detractor from the local component, falling 8%. This was driven by concerns over food inflation receding faster than anticipated, potentially impacting revenue and earnings forecasts. Market sentiment was further dampened by weakness in Bidcorp's UK and emerging market operations, where margins remained depressed. Despite these challenges, we maintain our confidence in Bidcorp as a core holding due to its geographic diversification, robust growth prospects, and attractive valuation relative to historical metrics.

The property sector experienced notable weakness this quarter, as the rate-sensitive sector was affected by the confirmation of a higher-for-longer interest rate narrative. The Developed Property Index returned -2.4% in USD (-5.6% in ZAR). Although the Fund's property component performed comparatively better, it still dragged on performance, returning -3.8% in ZAR on a weighted basis. Despite the challenging macro environment, the fundamentals of our holdings remain strong, as evidenced by their earnings releases during the quarter. These holdings are well-positioned to benefit significantly when the anticipated policy easing does materialise.

During the quarter, the Fund initiated a position in BHP Group and added to positions in CrowdStrike and Palo Alto. The Tencor position was exited, and Starbucks position was reduced.

Annualised performance: Annualised performance show longer term performance rescaled to a 1 year period. Annualised performance is the average return per year over the period. Actual annual figures are available to the investor on request.

Highest & Lowest return: The highest and lowest returns for any 1 year over the period since inception have been shown.

NAV: The net asset value represents the assets of a Fund less its liabilities.

WHY IS THIS FUND IN CATEGORY 4?

The Fund is rated as 4 due to exposure to shares and stocks, and the nature of its investments which include the risks previously listed. The price of shares and the income from them may fall as well as rise and investors may not get back the amount they have invested. WHAT DO THESE NUMBERS MEAN?
